Discover Love In the Library

SFPL welcomes author Maggie Tokuda-Hall this month. Tokuda-Hall's critically acclaimed picture book, Love in the Library, is based on her grandparents' experience in Minidoka, a Japanese internment camp in Idaho. Earlier this year, Tokuda-Hall received national media attention when she shared her experience working with the publisher Scholastic. Scholastic issued an apology after asking Tokuda-Hall to remove the words "virulent racism" in describing her grandparents' ordeal, and a paragraph about the ongoing legacy of racism in America, which they deemed "politically sensitive".

This month, Tokuda-Hall presents Love in the Library to share her grandparents' story of resiliency, love and humanity in the face of inhumane circumstances. She will be in conversation with an SFPL librarian in a program for all ages at the Main Library with an additional focus on the writing process, authenticity and representation on Asian Americans in literature.

Meet Artist Juana Alicia Araiza

he Library is thrilled to work with Juana Alicia Araiza (commonly known as Juana Alicia), one of the City's most prolific muralists and arts educators. Nopal de la Misión, her watercolor design for a glass mural that will be a highlight of the Mission Branch Library renovation, is featured in this year's iVIVA! campaign.


Juana Alicia has created murals and worked as a printmaker, sculptor, illustrator and studio painter for more than 30 years. Her style, akin to genres of contemporary Latin American literary movements, can be characterized as magical and social realism, and her work addresses issues of social justice, gender equality, environmental crisis and the power of resistance and revolution.

Born in 1953, Juana Alicia was shaped by many rich cultural influences growing up in Detroit, near Diego Rivera's Detroit Industry Murals. Her sculptural and painted public commissions (individual and collaborative) can be seen in Nicaragua, Mexico, Pennsylvania and in many parts of California, most notably in San Francisco. They include Sanarte at U.C.S.F. Medical Center, Santuario (with Emmanuel C. Montoya) at the San Francisco International Airport, La Llorona's Sacred Waters at 24th and York streets in the Mission, the Maestrapeace mural of the San Francisco Women's

Collections Corner: San Francisco Murals in the Archives

urals provide one of the best visual histories of San Francisco. Because murals change over time, the San Francisco History Center continuously collects to document this visual history. We have thousands of color slides of murals in the archives; two recommended collections are the San Francisco Mural Archive and James E. Gordon Color Slide Collection of San Francisco Murals.

The San Francisco Mural Archive includes color slides and descriptions of 826 murals painted between 1930 and 2001. The slides are from the collection of mural historian and photographer James Prigoff. The San Francisco Mural Archive also shows the changing murals on the billboard outside of Galeria de la Raza on 24th St. at Bryant. Since the 1970s, the billboard was frequently repainted and offered continually changing commentary on the Mission District community and politics.

The James E. Gordon Color Slide Collection of San Francisco Murals contains 465 color slides, which document murals in the City between 1976 and 1984. The collection contains significant documentation of Mission District murals including Garfield Park, 24th St. and Balmy Alley.



SFPL: What brings you joy when you are working on day-to-day operations with Fog City Gardener and the Gardens of Golden Gate Park?

JC: The opportunity to facilitate people's connections to plants. Helping people learn diverse plant stories
